Source of Water: WATERMANTo determine Waterman's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, information obtained during a Well Site Survey performed by the Illinois Rural Water Association on June 23, 1998 was reviewed. Based on this information, numerous potential sources of contamination were identified within proximity of this water supply's wells. The Illinois EPA does not consider the source water susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and the available hydrogeologic data on the wells.

Maximum residual disinfectant level goal or MRDLG:	The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
